Dear Sirs:

This letter is written to inform you of a dreadful experience we had with some of your microwave glassware. Our son, Michael, who resides in Warsaw, Indiana, gave us, as one of our extra Christmas presents, two 1-quart microwave glass containers and their covers.

About two weeks ago, we used them for the first time at dinner. Both bowls were on our dinner table alongside each other, when, suddenly, with a bang, the cover of one exploded and disintegrated into a thousand pieces! Fortunately, neither my husband nor our twenty-eight year old son, Gregory, who were seated at the table, were injured by the flying glass. Our dinner had to be thrown out, as you can imagine, the glass was everywhere.

The following information is furnished to help you resolve your problems:

The two bowls and covers were purchased December 17, 1985 at a "Target" store in Fort Wayne, Indiana (attached copy of sales slip enclosed).

The two pieces were used for the first time, and heated in the microwave at the same time.

Both bowls, with covers on, were taken out of the microwave oven and placed alongside each other on the table.

Food was taken from each of them, and the covers replaced back on them.

Approximately ten/fifteen minutes elapsed from the time the bowls were removed from the microwave oven to the time the cover exploded.

Neither bowl or cover was hit by any utensil or plate while on the table.

The one cover suddenly exploded.

None of the subject cookware has been used again.

Enclosed are some of the pieces from the cover being discussed. We have retained others. Also, here are the two bowls and the other cover.
